## Providing higher education is a wise investment

An investment in education is an investment in...

- ...**public safety**. Those who participate in correctional education are 43 percent less likely to return to prison after release than those who do not.\*
  - ...workforce development. Those who participate in academic or vocational programs obtain employment at a rate 13 percent higher than those who do not.\*
  - ...the children, families, and communities to which incarcerated students eventually return. Research has shown that children are more likely to attend college when their parents have done so.

# The Prison-to-College Pipeline (P2CP) provides much needed access to education before and after release — and the results speak for themselves



• 95% of P2CP students in the community are currently employed, enrolled in training programs, or working in internships

• Over 50% of released P2CP students have enrolled or are in the process of enrolling in college in the community

• Only 12.5% P2CP students have been reincarcerated, compared to 42% statewide

## CUNY Prison-to-College Pipeline (P2CP)

Founded in 2011, the Prison-to-College Pipeline (P2CP) is the result of a dynamic partnership between the City University of New York (CUNY) and the New York State Department of Corrections and Community Supervision (DOCCS).

#### **Accredited College-Level Courses**

• 46 students incarcerated at Otisville Correctional Facility have earned college credits in a variety of rigorous introductory courses taught by professors from John Jay and Hostos.

- Students who maintain a grade point average of C or better have a guaranteed seat at CUNY after release.
- With increased funding, we could offer two additional courses, making our students full-time.

### P2CP students can earn up to 12 college credits per year

#### Learning Exchanges

50 students from John Jay and Hostos have participated in monthly Learning Exchanges. For a full academic year, campus students learn alongside their incarcerated counterparts inside a classroom in Otisville Correctional Facility with faculty from across the disciplines.

Due to high demand for college and college prep, PRI has provided over 5,000 contact hours of remedial education and CUNY Assessment Testing at 6 correctional facilities

#### **Developmental Education**

PRI's new Developmental Education program:

- builds reading and writing skills that allow students to succeed in either P2CP or college in the community
- prepares students to pass the CUNY Assessment Test, the results of which are good for up to ten years.
- equips released students to enroll immediately in any CUNY institution upon their return to the community.

#### Increasing Intellectual Life in Prison with the Tribeca Film Institute

In partnership with the Tribeca Film Institute, PRI offers a film screening series open to all those incarcerated at Otisville and Shawangunk Correctional Facilities. In addition to screening a wide variety of movies and documentaries, TFI trains members of the Lifers and Long Termers Association to facilitate film-based discussion with the larger prison population.
